

South Monck Trail

Length: **7.5 kms**

Level of Difficulty: **Moderate**

Add: *“Come and enjoy a tour through one of Bracebridge’s oldest townships”*

Balls Dr Entrance

- The Balls Dr entrance is located off of Hwy 118 west. Simply turn right at the lights on to Balls Dr; there is a Shell gas station located at the stoplights. Follow Balls Dr and you will see the entrance to the trail on your right hand side.

Glendale Dr Entrance

- Balls Dr is located off of Hwy 118 west. Simply turn right at the lights on to Balls Dr; there is a Shell gas station located at the stop lights. Follow Balls Dr and turn right on to Tamarack Trail Dr. Follow Tamarack Trail Rd to the end where you will find Glendale Rd; you will see the South Monck Trail entrance across the road from the stop sign.

Meadow Heights Dr Entrance

- Meadow Heights Dr can be found on the left hand side going north on Muskoka Rd 4. The Trail entrance on Meadow Heights Dr can be found on the right hand side.

Moreland Crt Entrance

- Take a left on to Meadow Heights Dr coming north off of Muskoka Rd 4. Follow Meadow Heights all the way to the end and then take a right hand turn on to Moreland Crt; you will find the trail entrance at the turnaround.

Covered Bridge Entrance

- Take Balls Dr off of Hwy 118 west; Balls Dr turns into Covered Bridge Dr after you go by Zellers. The trail entrance can be found on the right hand side just after the covered bridge.

Crawford Rd Entrance

- Take Hwy 118 West where you will notice the Muskoka Highlands Golf course to your right. You will take a right on to South Monck Dr which is perpendicular with the golf course. Follow South Monck Dr all the way to the end and turn right on to Crawford Rd; you will find the trail entrance at the end the road.

Clover Cickers Clubhouse

- Along your journey, you will pass by an old hunt camp still used to this very day.

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Environmental Pond

- When on the Covered Bridge section of the trail, you will come across an environmental pond where wildlife can be observed such as ducks, frogs and geese.
